Sept. 17 County Board certifies 2020 maximum property tax levy.

Mid-November Notices of 2020 estimated taxes mailed.

Nov. 25 Public Hearing #2 (6:30 p.m. at Ramsey County Library - Maplewood).

Dec. 17 County Board votes on 2020-2021 Budget and final levy.



The Budget Top Line

Overall budget increase:

2020: 0.5%

2021: 2.9%

Proposed general levy increase:

2020: 4.75%

2021: 4.50%

 Regional Rail levy remains at the statutory maximum:

2020: \$25,964,032 (7% increase) **2021:** \$27,724,123 (6.8% increase)


- No HRA levy is requested.
- Revenue from non-levy sources is 55% of overall budget.

2020: \$408,553,286 **2021**: \$415,731,761

Where County Funds Come From: 2020





Property trends: Basic Overview

- Taxes are tied to property values and levies of taxing jurisdictions.
- Assessed values are driven by the real estate market.
- Commercial tax rates are higher than residential tax rates.
- Commercial, residential and apartment values continue to increase across the county...
- ... this has generally been the trend neighborhood by neighborhood – since the end of the 'great recession' in 2012.



Refunds through the State

- Own and occupy property on Jan. 2, 2020.
- Total Household Income < \$115,020.
 - Other income-based thresholds may apply.
- Property tax increase of >12% and >\$100.

Senior Citizen Deferral

- 65 or older.
- Household income of < \$60,000.
- Lived in home for at least 15 years.
