Personnel Training - What's Required?

Are you meeting your requirements?

All hazardous waste generators have basic management requirements which provide for the safe handling and proper disposal of hazardous wastes. Depending on the quantity of waste

you generate, your company's hazardous waste training requirements may be different, from the company down the street, your friend's or your competition's company. Generally, the more waste you generate, the more



What size generator am I?

You need to know what size generator your company is in order to identify and meet your training requirements. Minnesota Rule pt. 7045.0206 identifies three size categories of hazardous waste generators:

- Large Quantity Generators (LQG)

 companies that generate greater
 than or equal to 1000 kg of waste
 per month; approximately 2200 lbs.
 or 4 (or more) 55 gallon drums per month.
- Small Quantity Generators (SQG) companies that generate between 100 and 1000 kg of waste per month; between 220 lbs. and 2200 lbs. or 1/2 drum up to 4 drums per month.
- Very Small Quantity Generator (VSQG) – companies that generate less than or equal to 100 kg of waste per month; approximately 220 lbs. or 1/2 drum per month.

Make a list of all the hazardous waste you generate and add up the volume, excluding exempt wastes, like used oil and related wastes, spent lead acid

> batteries and other scrap metals, fluorescent lamps, and universal wastes, to find out where your company fits in.

What's the next step?

Our goal is to help your company generate less hazardous waste. One of the most effective ways to avoid generating

unnecessary wastes and problems relating to hazardous waste is to thoroughly train employees on how to perform their job duties safely and properly. This knowledge can lead to improved efficiency and reduced waste. Effective training enables your employees to identify ways to improve performance and processes.

What's required for my company?

VSQGs have no formal or documented training requirements. However, employees need to be familiar enough with waste handling procedures and proper emergency response to maintain your company's compliance. Training employees, whether on the job or in the classroom, is really the only way to accomplish this. To determine an individual's training needs, think about the types of job responsibilities they perform. We strongly recommend that all employees are trained in your emergency response procedures.

SQGs must document that they have trained their employees **once** in the hazardous waste and emergency response duties that are relevant to their jobs. If they handle waste or sign manifests only, those are the items they need to be trained in. Ensure that employees who require training have received it within six months of their hire date or any change in their job responsibilities. Additionally, these employees may not perform these duties unsupervised until this training has been done.

LQGs have much more comprehensive training requirements, including:

- Having a designated hazardous waste program coordinator.
- Keeping records listing job titles, job descriptions, and job requirements.
- An outline or description of the contents of the training course.
- Training new employees within 6 months of hiring.
- Annual refresher training, and
- Maintaining documentation on all hazardous waste training.

Keep in mind that hazardous waste training is in addition to the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) annual employee Right-To-Know training and the hazardous materials training required by the Department of Transportation (DOT). However, since all of these trainings cover similar and overlapping subjects they could be successfully incorporated into one training program.

Open Data Portal



A unique view into demolition waste

In 2017, Ramsey County launched its Open Data Portal, a website dedicated to sharing information from county programs with the general public and interested parties. Our Pre-demolition Inspection Program was one of the first to have its own page on the portal.

Tracking hazardous items

Visitors can see the amounts of hazardous items tracked from over 1,600 pre-demolition inspections going back to 2009. The data is arranged by the amount and type of material and whether they came from residential or commercial demolitions. You have the option to manipulate the data online, including sorting by year or making graphs. The dataset can also be downloaded as an excel file for further analysis.

At home or at work?

Analyzing demolition waste data can also provide you with a better idea of what you might have at home or work. For example, roughly 92% of residential and 80% of commercial buildings still have asbestos present. Some of the most common items removed from buildings are paints and appliances - both those that contain CFC refrigerant (commonly referred to as Freon) and those that do not.

- CFC-containing appliances and oil-based paint are more often found in commercial demolitions
- Non-CFC appliances and latex paint are more commonly found in residential demolitions.

Moving forward the program has plans to expand the data available and use it to educate Ramsey County residents and businesses on the importance of proper disposal of household items and building materials.

Local stories

Metro Manufacturing switched to single-sort recycling and is saving more than \$1,500 annually on trash service. They are diverting around 14,000 pounds of recyclables each year.

Grand Avenue Veterinary Center called their trash hauler to clarify their pricing, reducing their bill by 40%, saving them about \$2,000 per year.

Bona Bros. Auto and Truck cut their trash pick-ups and are diverting nine tons of single-sort recycling and eight tons of cardboard annually, resulting in monthly cost savings on their trash bills.

Questions, Questions (and some answers!)

We are cleaning out our storage area and have old chemicals to dispose of. How do we go about using the Very Small Quantity Generator collection program?

Ramsey County's Very Small Quantity Generator (VSQG) collection program, operated by Bay West, allows Ramsey County businesses licensed as a VSQG to transport their hazardous waste themselves for disposal. You bypass the use of a licensed hazardous waste transporter, which can save your business money.

Here are the criteria for using the VSQG collection program:

- Waste is not accepted without an appointment.
 Call 651-291-3451 to schedule your appointment.
- Have your hazardous waste identification number (HWID) ready. If your company does not have a HWID, contact county staff at 651-266-1199 for assistance.
- Have a list of the types and quantities of wastes.
 This can include a Safety Data Sheet (SDS) for each waste. If an SDS doesn't exist, a general familiarity of the waste, such as how it was used or the process that generated it, will suffice.

• Do not bring packaging, empty containers, or nonhazardous wastes. Bay West cannot take your trash.

You must follow these transportation guidelines:


- Transport waste in containers that are no larger than five gallons and can be left at the facility.
- Containers must be closed, labeled, in good condition and secured in the vehicle to prevent spills or breakage.
- Keep incompatible waste separated.
- Transport fluorescent lamps in the original (or similar) container. Do not tape them together.
