# What Is HHW?

Household Hazardous Waste: Waste generated from household activity that exhibits the characteristics of or that is listed as hazardous waste under agency rules but is not generated from commercial activities.

- Corrosive (can corrode or cause chemical burns)
- Ignitable (can easily catch fire)
- Reactive (can react with other chemicals or oxygen)
- TOXIC (poisonous or harmful if swallowed, inhaled, or exposed to skin)

## Accepted Items - HHW is usually identified by the product label

#### **Home Improvement Products**

- · Paint, varnish and stain
- · Paint stripper, paint thinner, turpentine
- Petroleum-based adhesives
- Roofing tar
- Mercury thermostats
- Wood preservatives
- Driveway sealer

No frozen or dried out products.



#### **Automotive Products**

- Carburetor cleaner
- Degreasers
- Fuel (gasoline, kerosene)
- · Motor oil, oil filters and antifreeze
- Petroleum-based waxes and finishes

#### **Household Products**

- Aerosols
- Batteries
- · Drain and oven cleaner
- · Mercury thermometers
- Mercury thermostats
- Nail polish and remover
- Propane tanks



#### **Used Sharps**

- Hypodermic needles
- Syringes
- Lancets
- Pen needles
- IV needles
- Used Epi-Pens\*



Place sharps in rigid, puncture resistant container. Label container: "Do Not Recycle: Household Sharps." Seal to prevent spills.

#### Fluorescent Bulbs

- Compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs)
- Fluorescent bulbs
- High intensity discharge (HID)

Fluorescent bulbs contain mercury. Intact or broken, it is illegal to put them in the garbage.

Do not tape fluorescent tubes together.

#### Lawn & Garden Products

- · Ant, bug, roach and rodent killer
- Bug spray
- · Fertilizer with weed control
- Weed killer







Why collect HHW?

Decrease risks: Fires, Chemical Exposures, Soil and Groundwater contamination











# HHW Disposal



#### Reused/Recovered:

Oil paint, flammable liquids/solvents, most aerosols, propane tanks



## Recycled:


Latex Paint, used motor oil & filters, driveway sealer, fluorescent lamps



#### **Incinerated**:

Pesticides, poisons, dioxins, oil paint with PCB's, some aerosols














## RAMSEY COUNTY

How do residents participate?

- 1. Gather items for disposal that are HHW (Paint, batteries, used oil, fluorescent light bulbs, sharps, etc.)
- 2. Check HHW site hours and location.
- 3. Deliver HHW to a collection site where trained HHW staff will collect it for proper management.
- 4. Stop by the product reuse room while you are there!





# Electronic Waste – <u>NOT</u> currently accepted at Ramsey County HHW



Currently accepted at Repowered in St. Paul and will be accepted at the new Environmental Service Center (ESC).



## 2022 Product Reuse Room Data

- 166,579 lbs. reused
- 8,442 participants taking products
- \$89,746 saved in recycling/disposal costs









HHW participation has ranged from 12% to 15% of households in Ramsey County over the past 5 years.

It is anticipated that the centrally located Environmental Service Center will boost participation rates as it attracts more residents with expanded services including:

- Food scraps
- Recycling drop-off
- Fix-it Clinics
- Electronic waste recycling.
- Expanded Product Reuse Room
