







Preferred Alternative Streetca odern Cally






Where Are We Now?

Engineering and Pre-Environmental Phase

Purpose: Further refine the technical details for the Locally Preferred Alternative: A modern streetcar route between downtown Saint Paul and MSP Airport and the Mall of America, generally along W. 7th Street




Refinement of Locally Preferred Alternative

Route

- Light rail transit connections.
- Seven Corners/Smith Avenue.
- CP Spur parallel to West 7th Street.
- Highway 5 river crossing.
- Bloomington South Loop/Mall of America.
- Operating environment
 - Dedicated and shared use.
 - Center- or side-running.




Section 106

- Basis for Section 106
 - National Historic Preservation Act, as amended
 - Implementing regulations (36 Code of Federal Regulations § 800)
- Requires that federal agencies with jurisdiction over a proposed project, in this case FTA, take into account any effects of the proposed project on historic properties

Participation in Section 106



Participants and Roles

- Ramsey County Regional Rail Authority project applicant
- Federal Transit Administration (FTA) lead federal agency responsible for taking into account effects on historic properties
- State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) aids and assists federal agencies
- Native American Tribes special knowledge of and relationship to resources in the project area
- Consulting Parties other groups and individuals who have a demonstrated interest in historic properties that may be affected by the undertaking
 - Property owners
 - Neighborhood groups
 - Local units of government
- Other Federal agencies

National Register of Historic Places



National Register of Historic Places

- Official list of nation's historic properties
- Property types include buildings, structures, objects, sites, and districts
- National Register Criteria for Evaluation:
 - Criterion A: Event.
 - Criterion B: Significant Person.
 - Criterion C: Design/Construction.
 - Criterion D: Information Potential.
- Seven aspects of integrity: setting, materials, location, workmanship, design, feeling, and association




- 1887 Czech-Slovak Protective Society meeting hall serving Saint Paul's Czech American community
- Longest serving national hall in Minnesota
- Also longest serving Czech-Slovak hall in continuous use in the U.S.






- 1890 Renaissance Revival bank and office building
- Dates to Saint Paul's 1880s-1890s boom
- Designed and then tenanted by Clarence H. Johnston, Sr. while serving as State Architect 1891–1931





- 1855-1857 Justus Ramsey Stone House
- Oldest known house still standing in Saint Paul
- Well-preserved pioneer cottage
- Exhibits fine masonry of local limestone




