Night to Unite registration deadline is July 19! Get your neighborhood event registered <u>online</u>

Along with the traditional display of outdoor lights and front porch vigils, cities, towns and neighborhoods celebrate Night to Unite (National Night Out) with a variety of events and activities such as block parties, cookouts and visits from local police and fire departments.

This annual celebration occurs on the first Tuesday in August and gathers neighborhoods and public safety personnel together for an evening to promote safe communities. Register your event so that deputies, firefighters, and public safety can plan to stop by for a visit.



2019 Night to Unite will take place on Tuesday, August 6, 2019.

Night to Unite goals are to:

- Strengthen neighborhood spirits and public safety-community partnerships.
- Generate support and participation in crime prevention and community policing programs.
- Heighten crime and drug prevention awareness.
- Let criminals know that you are committed to keeping your neighborhood safe.

Night to Unite has proven to be an effective, inexpensive, and enjoyable opportunity to promote neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships in pursuit of safer communities. Community benefits often extend beyond this single evening event as neighbors get to know each other and the public safety agencies that serve them.

Minnesota's new hands-free law - August 1, 2019

Beginning August 1, 2019 drivers in Minnesota will be required to stay off their phones or have their phones in hands-free mode while their vehicle is moving, or at a stoplight.



Any driver who is used to being on the phone should take the time now to start adapting to the new handsfree law, well before it takes effect and the strict enforcement begins.

What's the Law?

- The new law allows a driver to use their cell phone to make calls, text, listen to music or podcasts and get directions, but only by voice commands or single touch activation without holding the phone. Remember, hands free is not necessarily distraction free.
- You may not hold your phone in your hand.
- A driver may not use their phone at any time for video calling, video live-streaming, Snapchat, gaming, looking at video or photos stored on the phone, using apps, reading texts and scrolling or typing on the phone.
- Hand-held phone use is allowed to obtain emergency assistance, if there is an immediate threat to life and safety, or when in an authorized emergency vehicle while performing official duties.


During July and August, the Minnesota Department of Public Safety will lead an awareness campaign with the goals of educating all Minnesotans about the new law and to, over time, help contribute to a reduction in citations and crashes involving drivers on their mobile phones. 
After August 1 police can stop anyone they see holding a phone while driving, including while stopped at a traffic light. The penalty for violating the law is a petty misdemeanor, carrying a \$50 fine for the first violation and a \$275 fine for subsequent violations (plus court costs).




Troubling trend – early morning burglaries enabled by garage door openers

While warm weather often leads to increased crimes of opportunity – more ne'er-do-wells out and about looking for the easy steal – there has been a troubling trend toward more serious crimes that started with the easy steal. The trauma of people waking up to start their day only to find that their home has been entered, with items and vehicles stolen, have been reported to police throughout the twin cities, including all seven of our communities patrolled by the Sheriff's Office.

Since mid-May deputies have investigated multiple burglaries that started when the thief found a garage door opener in an unlocked vehicle in the driveway. The thieves then rummage through the vehicles in the garage, steal bikes and other easy items. If the service door is unlocked the thief will enter the home and steal purses, wallets, phones, backpacks, tablets, etc. When keys are available the thieves will steal a car, driving it right out of the garage.

Law enforcement agencies throughout the metro area are working to find these emboldened thieves. The Sheriff's Office has conducted extra patrols and is actively investigating leads.



A common denominator has been that neighbors who took simple precautions were not victimized. Reduce your risk with these steps:


- Bring garage door remotes into the house at night.
- Lock all vehicle doors.
- Lock house/garage service door.
- Report thefts and suspicious activity immediately to 9-1-1.

At the end of your day a double check that items are secure, doors are closed and locked removes temptation and prevents crime.

Neighborhood Watch is simply Neighbors and Deputies working together.

Involved neighbors are more likely to have open communication lines with each other, deputies, and the whole community. Information sharing on crime prevention, crime trends, and law enforcement issues is a key element to the Neighborhood Watch program of the Sheriff's Office.
